A Police Advisory Board meeting was held on the above date at the MPD Headquarters and via Zoom conference call, with the following members in attendance: In person: Salahudin Bin-Yusif, Joyce Kidd, Billy Warrick and Jason Hunt. Police Captain Ron Davis and FOP President Joseph Womer were also in attendance at the MPD HQ. The meeting was called to order at 7:05 p.m. by Chairman Bin-Yusif.

#### **CHAIR'S REPORT:**

Mayor & Council Special Meeting: Chair Bin-Yusif said he has spoken to Mayor Branner and the Mayor & Council would like to have a meeting on Wednesday, Sept. 6 at 7 p.m. He said he has sent out an email to the Board letting them know about the meeting. He said the plan is to meet to go over the structure of the Advisory Board, how things are going, moving forward. He said he wasn't sure if the NAAACP would be in attendance as well, but he knows the organization has requested to be a part of the meeting.

He said this Advisory Board has been going for three years now and he feels they've made some good progress, but if it's going to move forward, the Board needs to put a little more effort to be able to push it forward to the next group in a "reputable manner."

Bin-Yusif said the reason he wanted to meet tonight, even though the meeting was originally supposed to be canceled, he wanted help working on the next "annual report" to give to the Mayor & Council.

### **COMMITTEE REPORTS**

**Community Connections** – Jason Hunt said he is working to put out the information about the loss of Officer Mark Miller to honor him on all of the MPAB's social media platforms. Bin-Yusif also offered condolences to the Captain and Womer on the loss of Officer Miller.

### POLICE CHIEF REPORT

Captain Davis gave the police report that was distributed at the August meeting of the Mayor & Council. The following questions were asked following the report:

Joyce Kidd asked how to reach the MPD after hours because her neighbor wanted to make a non-emergency call about some suspicious people but he didn't feel like it was an emergency. Womer said they could call 911 or the non-emergency number. Either way, it will get to the right person and wouldn't be dispatched as an emergency unless it was one.

#### **SURVEY RESULTS**

Bin-Yusif asked Kristen Krenzer to share the survey results with the MPAB.

Krenzer said the results showed the following:

There were a total of 173 respondents. More women responded (59 percent). Those between the ages 40-60 responded at a higher rate (48 percent). 38 percent of the respondents were from the Estates at St. Anne's. Kudos were given to Board member Jason Hunt for his efforts to have his neighborhood respond. "Just put it out on all of the social medias, it works," Hunt said.

The Board discussed what the results of the survey mean to them.

Jason Hunt said it seems like it validates what the PAB has been working toward for the past three years. The people feel safe and they are more concerned with traffic issues than anything else right now, but they also are saying that they want more communication between the police department and the community – and the PAB, too, he said.

Joyce Kidd agreed, stating the MPD does a great job of providing events such as the National Night Out and Drug Take-Back events, but people still seem to want more.

Bin-Yusif said his immediate take-back from the survey is that people are generally happy with the MPD and its officers and they appreciate the officers when they see them out and about, but we still need to do some work with communications and the social media outreach.
